# On the Cover


I came to be a Model T owner quite by surprise. My Uncle Ray's health was failing him and he hadn't started the car in over 5 years. As a result, he offered me the Model T, I accepted the offer and bought the car but sadly soon after he passed away.

My time with the car has been interesting. It turns out the mechanical condition of the Roadster was quite poor. I attempted on two occasions to drive the car on the Annual Run but ran into problems just prior to them. The first on the morning of the run my car had no power. After the run I discovered the capacitors in most of the coils I had failed. The second run the brake band failed the week before.

However, I did make it to the Kangaroo Island trip albeit with the car running quite poorly. It was close as I almost

turned back on several occasions but pushed on to Normanville for the first stop on the trip. No turning back from there. One thing about a Model T, if it's got fuel and spark it will run.

I must thank again the members that assisted me on the trip as it was a big



Heading home the run up the hill out of Cape Jarvis was slow but once over the top things were good. The run back from Normanville to home highlighted I had a carburetor issue and to top it off the Bendix spring went when I pulled over to adjust an ever-changing mix-

ture. I rebuilt the carburetor, fixed the starter motor, and started fault finding. Low compression with valves clearances out of adjust. were seating properly and the slop in the inlet valve that was open was amazing. The lifter to were sloppy so the engine came out and was stripped. New valves and lifter and new bushes throughout the transmission. Back on the road just prior to the National Rally in Dubbo with the engine running sweet. I did a little bit of running around my neighborhood, probably around 20km, before leaving for the national rally.

The trip to the National Rally wasn't without incident as I had just previously purchased a rather cheap Falcon sedan that passed by my nose for towing purposes. It was more a case of having something and then replacing it when I have a better idea of what I need, which I have. On the morning of the Queens commemorative public holiday on the edge of the Hay Plain the rear brake line broke. Unable to resolve the issue we made the decision to push on and make repairs the following day with just the front and trailer brakes, this makes for a somewhat stressful trip. It turned out just as easy to contin-

ue to Dubbo for repairs.

At the national rally I drove the car around the day before. On the day of the rally, I made the start and 8 km in trouble struck and then I was out. A combination of me having the brake band over tight and one of the triple gears seizing on the shaft. It appears that the new bushes I purchased through Synders have the wrong mix of brass in the bushes. Back

home with new studs in the transmission and replacing the faulty bush, the car is running well.

Last year's Annual run to Monta Bay the car performed well. Getting over the Hummocks Range with ease (for a standard Model T) and even enduring the strong cross wind on the way home. Of course, there is still more to sort out, but I suspect there will always be something.

Model T pick up and a 1953 Four Forty-four Wolseley. I arrived with my dove grey 1982 Alfa Romeo Giulietta. The T was on its maiden run and Michael was checking it out to see what else would need to be done to get it into top condition. Not to be outdone Jim had to show me the old-fashioned indicator that popped out from the side of the Wolseley, very impressive. Jim and Glenys shepherded Michael and his family back to Angle Vale.



I moved on to the next meeting point at the Lyndoch bakery. David & Gayle Carver were there with their poppy red 1966 Ford Mustang, the Left Hand Drive one. In an effort to elicit an interesting story I ask them if the Pope had ever driven in it. They answered, "No, but we do have a 1923 Model T Ford that we call the Pope Mobile." A 1984 Burgundy 240 GL VOLVO sedan brought by Rod & Cheryl Crawford was a real eye-catcher. Cheryl's Dad, Arthur, bought it new. After Cheryl inherited it it was kept in the shed for 16 years. A great deal of spit and polish and brand new brakes and tires saw it fit to be seen in public again. John & Di Eastick came in Di's 1972 Radar Red Volkswagen Super Bug. Di had always wanted to get one as her first car but her dad talked her into it letting him buy her a Honda. Years later, at a friend's 70th birthday party, there it was the car of her dreams. After a couple of glasses champagne, Di plucked up the courage to ask if it was for sale and it WAS .Her name is Susie Super Bug.

After a coffee and some sticky buns we moved on to Bethany. Pete Friend (by name and nature) brought Albert Jones in Pete's Rover 3I Coupe, originally imported to Perth from England. When Pete bought it, it was transported by train to Adelaide. Rod & Doretta Hills' 1971 SJ 6 Pine Green Jaguar I found one row over. (It might be a good idea to come a little early next time so that we can all park together.) The original owner shedded the car for 16 years before selling it to Rod. On one of its early runs, to the Sudan swap meet, the fan broke loose from the engine and fell through the radiator. Ron could not get hold of Doretta but she was woken by the neighbour to tell her of the disaster. Many dollars later it was brought home and fixed.

Ian & Sue Oates came in a Coral Red 1971 XY Falcon. Ian had the same model new when he was 19. With them were Tigger (the Australian cattle dog) and Brenton & Emily in a 1970 Mach 1 Red Mustang with Racing stripes which Ian bought last year.


John Clark was there with his 1917

bought it three months ago. Much
vigorous polishing by John Clarke
made it glow so much that David had
to shield his eyes from the glare. Stu-



art & Lynda Bowshall's 1922 T Tourer was decked out with perfect little oval windows in the side and back curtains. Stuart was pulled over by the police whilst driving it one day. The constable suggested that he could improve his rear view by fitting side mirrors. He'd obviously never sat in a model T and how much vibration they make. We each got ourselves comfortable and started eating the delicious lunches that we had each brought. After lunch there was time to make the rounds of all the magnificent cars that were on display around the oval. I came across a beautiful grey 1922, Duncan and Frazer bodied, Model T pick up. Herb Pollard had restored it years ago when he was still a member of our club. It was originally made for the Adelaide Power Company. The photos he showed me

of it, as he found it abandoned in a field, demonstrated just how much work restoring a "barn find" can be.

These are easy, oven baked and delicious, makes 20.

300gm chicken mince

1/4 shredded Chinese cabbage (about a cup)

1 carrot, peeled and grated

1 zucchini grated

2 spring onions, thinly sliced

½ cup grated tasty cheese

1 egg lightly beaten


20 frozen spring roll wrappers, thawed

Rice noodles softened in hot water

1 tbsp soy sauce and 2 tbsp oyster sauce

Coriander if liked

Sweet and sour dipping sauce, sweet plum sauce and sweet chilli sauce for serving



Place 1 wrapper on workbench, with 1 corner facing you . Place 2 tbsps filling along the center of the wrapper. Fold the corner over the filling. Fold over sides and roll up tightly to enclose. Place seam side down on tray. Spray rolls with oil.

Bake for 25 to 30 minutes until light golden and crisp. Serve with dipping sauces.



# Model T Ford Club Charity of Choice 2023/24


Did you know that Veterans are twice as likely as other Australians to experience post-traumatic stress disorder.

The program is ensuring veterans improve the quality of their lives and have a pathway to recovery from their PTSD, with improved mental and physical wellbeing.








#### MODEL T FORD BASIC SPECIFICATIONS - CONTINUED No 2

IGNITION SYSTEM- The model T Fords engine ignition system used a flywheel mounted magneto to produce the current necessary to produce a spark to initiate combustion.

This current was distributed by the timer mounted on the right front of the engine, analogous to a distributor on a modern vehicle, to one of the trembler coils, one for each cylinder. The coil stepped up the voltage and discharged it to the spark plug in each respective cylinder.

The ignition timing was adjusted manually by using the spark advance lever in the cab mounted on the steering column, which in turn rotated the timer by advancing or retarding the ignition timing spark. A certain amount of skill and experience was required to find the optimal spark timing for any speed and load.

The magneto was the first model T Ford component to be assembled on the assembly line and the method was copied to many other model T Ford production segments. The ignition system on the Fordson Tractor was similar to the Model T Ford.




#### ELECTRICAL SYSTEM- In the early

years of the model T Ford production all engines were started by using the crank handle. A battery could be used to supply ignition current for starting, since it could be difficult to hand crank a very cold engine fast enough for the magneto to produce sufficient current. However, although all model Ts had a "BAT" position on the coil box switch and a corresponding terminal on the box. Ford did not supply or even encourage the use of a battery before 1919, when it introduced a battery driven electric starter. Even this was not standard equipment for all models until sometime in 1926, the last year of production.


Most cars sold after 1919 were equipped with a starter motor, which was operated by a small foot operated button switch mounted on the floor. These cars included a battery and generator for recharging the battery. In keeping with the goal of reliability and simplicity, the trembler coils and magneto ignition system was retained even on vehicles with a starter motor.

When electric headlights were introduced in 1915, the magneto was upgraded to supply enough power for the lights and horn. If a model T Ford was equipped with a starter motor, the upgraded electrical system would also be used to supply power to these items.



### 1919-1925 T W,ring Starter and brake light.




TRANSMISSION- The transmission is of the Ford spur planetary type, the type that by actual test has proven its superiority over every other type of transmission. The advantages lie in the longer life of such a transmission stripped gears, impossible, and the smooth velvety action as opposed to the jerky vibrating action of other types, which racks transmission, engine, gears and axles.

Low speed and reverse clutches are of the fibre steel band type. These bands grip smoothly and when disengaged spring away from the drums, assuring positive action without waste of power. The high-speed clutch is of the multiple disc type so designed as to give the maximum bearing surface. This multiple disc clutch is composed of smooth steel discs interposed, if left standing for extended time will stick together and effect the natural neutral, and caution should be taken when starting the vehicle.

The reverse power of the engine and the flexibility of both engine and transmission really make a transmission gear almost un-necessary, for the model T can

climb hills or negotiate muddy and sandy roads on high speed with the high speed in, by throttle control any speed from 3 to 40 m/h can be obtained. This is a very sturdy and reliable transmission.






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#### Would you believe a woman invented the Wind Screen Wiper

It may seem hard to imagine a world without windshield wipers, but there was one, and Mary Anderson lived in that world.

In 1902, she was visiting New York City. "She was riding a streetcar and it was snowing," While she was riding the streetcar that snowy day, "She observed that the streetcar driver had to get out and continually clean off the windshield."

Naturally, that caused delays, and got Anderson wondering: What if there were some sort of blade that could wipe off the windshield without making the driver get out of the streetcar?



Anderson went back to Birmingham, made a sketch of her device, and wrote up a description of it. Then she applied for a patent.


The patent application describes how the wiper was to be operated by a handle inside the vestibule of the motor car and be easily removable — "thus leaving nothing to mar the usual appearance of the car during fair weather,"

The application was filed June 18, 1903. On November 10, 1903, the United States Patent Office awarded Anderson patent.

Anderson tried to interest manufacturing firms to make this device for the emerging motorcar industry but got no takers.

A letter from the firm of Dinning and Eckenstein read:

"Dear madam," the letter begins," We beg to acknowledge receipt of your recent favor with reference to the sale of your patent. In reply, we regret to state we do not consider it to be of such commercial value as would warrant our undertaking its sale."



It makes you wonder why the invention never went anywhere, but you would suspect it might have been because Anderson was an independent woman.

"She didn't have a father; she didn't have a husband and she didn't have a son," "And the world was kind of run by men back then."

Mary Anderson lived long enough to see the windscreen wiper mounted on all cars.

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
